

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

I am always grateful to the Session each summer when I am able to spend time away on an island twelve miles off the coast of Maine. It is a family time and a chance to play and read and reflect. This year it is in two parts, a week around the holiday weekend when I will preach at the island church and then a little later for three weeks before returning in time for Rally Day in mid-August when the church year will shift into high gear.

The Pulpit Harbor Church where I will be leading worship on July 2 was organized in 1804 and its tidy clapboard building dates from the 1840s. But for an historic congregation, its members are mostly interested in the future. That is how it should be. We should know and honor our heritage since this is how identity is strengthened. But keeping eyes too much on the past leads to traditionalism, which is an unhealthy way to relate to the past. Then nothing can change.

How does First regard the future? Do we pray to the God who was helpful in ages past but oppose the God who is the hope for years to come? The summer is a good time for us to consider where we are going as a church before a new program year begins on August 20. I hope First is always ready to try something new. It is significant that the ministries that rate the highest participation, for example the justice advocacy ministry called JUST, are among our newer ministries. An openness to the future requires a vision for ministry that is broadly shared.


General Assembly moderator, Marge Carpenter, preached at First several years ago. She said a church's mission could be superbly summed up by Jesus in the Great Commission and the Good Samaritan. The Session might take that biblical vision and sketch what it means for our time and place. There needs to be excitement about First's future—our worship and fellowship should get our hearts beating faster. We do not need to think alike about every point of our common life, but we can strive to love alike in order to love as our Lord loves with a comprehending love for all people.

A while ago I came across a book, Beyond the Ordinary: Ten Strengths of U.S. Congregations, written by Cynthia Woolever and Deborah Bruce and published by Westminster/John Knox Press. They link this future orientation with three other qualities of congregational life that we should cultivate. Church members tend to embrace the future to the extent that they: 1. Have a strong sense of belonging to the community of faith, 2. Are involved in the leadership of the church and thus feel like "stakeholders" and, 3. Have members who believe the congregation's greatest opportunities for mission are in the future. A Facilities Task Force chaired by John Tatum is working diligently to assess our aged campus with several deferred maintenance issues. That is a necessary springboard as we begin to explore new ministries that will command our attention if we are to fulfill the mandate of the Great Commission and follow the example of the Good Samaritan. A sampling of possibilities include more small groups for study and fellowship, more extensive outreach to our neighbors, and greater collaboration with Butler Church.

Grateful for the refreshment of summer and the slower pace of the season, I look forward to mid-August when we can think together about the future. Psalm 138 challenges us: "You answered when we called. You built up strength within us. You will do everything you have promised us. Complete the work you have begun."



ADULT CLASS


SUNDAYS, JULY 2 - AUGUST 13 | 9:30AM


IDEAS FOR SUMMER

NEW MEMBER CLASS


SUNDAYS, JULY 9 & 16 | 9:30AM
